Advanced Higher Gàidhlig

Course information

- At this level, pupils must be able to speak and write in a coherent, accurate and appropriate manner.
- Pupils continue to develop their skills of analysis and evaluation of language in a variety
 of ways including the study of literature.
- It is of paramount importance that pupils engage with the community in which they live
 in order to develop their linguistic skills and further their awareness of the language
 and culture.

In particular, Advanced Higher Gàidhlig aims to enable learners to:

- develop the ability to express and communicate meaning at a high level of sophistication
- develop the ability to communicate in writing at a high level of sophistication with respect to audience, context and purpose
- deepen awareness of language and how it works, taking account of style, grammar,
 structure and idiom, and local or regional influences on language
- develop the ability to analyse and evaluate texts from different genres
- develop awareness of translating from written English to written Gaelic and interpreting from spoken Gaelic to spoken or written English
- interact with an individual or group on Gaelic-related issues and engage in individual
 and group study of topics of a historical or cultural nature
- apply higher-order thinking
- develop advanced critical literacy
- learn independently
- plan and research, integrating and applying language skills, for a range of purposes including independent study

Internal Unit Assessment - marked on a pass/fail basis

Unit 1: Translating and Interpreting Skills

- One translating assessment (English to Gaelic)
- One assessment converting spoken Gaelic into English

Unit 2: Writing and Literary Criticism Skills

- One writing assessment
- One literature assessment based on an unseen text

Unit 3: Specialist Study of Language and/or Culture

 Plan and research an independent specialist study on an aspect of Gaelic literature and/or language and/or culture. You must create a study plan and you must select, analyse, evaluate evidence and reach conclusions.

There are 5 internal unit assessments in total.
